Nearly heart-shaped these leaves are between 2-4 inches, smaller than the American Linden or "Basswood". The leaves

are finely sawtoothed coming to a sharp point. Don't confuse these duller green leaves with those of the Bartlett Pear which are shiny and have curly edges

The flowers are distinctive because they are obvious, hanging from a long greenish-white leaf-like

bract. The flowers themselves are perfumed and sweet, attracting the bees in the spring. The fruit are small, hard, brownish-red berries.

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A mature Littleleaf can be recognized by its distinctive shape: a dense rounded top cone. The bark is dark grey and smooth, becoming furrowed with age.
