A wide elliptical leaf with 7-11 pointed lobes which are not cut toward the center very deeply. The lobes may have a few irregular brittle-tipped teeth. Turns dark red or brown in the autumn.

The acorns can be larger than an inch long and are egg-shaped with less than one-third covered by the cup. This is contrasted with the Pin Oak which has a small round acorn and a very shallow cap.
