The leaves are 2-5 inches long and are long pointed. They are sharply toothed except near the rounded base which has unequal sides like all members of the Elm family. They are often marked by rounded galls caused by tiny plant lice.

The twigs of the tree are zig-zag, changing direction in a plane at each leaf node. Often the small red berries remain on the tree throughout winter.

The name of the tree is derived from a Scottish word for the cherry-like fruit: the "hagberry" or marsh-berry. The branches often become deformed with twig clusters called "witches brooms." The leaves are often marked by round galls caused by plant lice.
