ArborTags

The leaves are 3-5 inches long and are quite variable having two or even three broad blunt lobes. The margins are without teeth, and the leaf stems are long. A crushed leaf is quite aromatic.

The fruit of the Sassafras is a small shiny blue-black berry held in a reddish cup on a long red stem. In autumn the fruit matures to a single brown seed.
